Three Practical Steps the Church in Botswana Can Take to Respond to the Crisis of Community and Collective Resilience

These discussions can foster a sense of ownership and inclusion, encouraging collective action and mutual support in times of difficulty.

This initiative can be extended to skills-sharing workshops where members exchange knowledge on resilience strategies, such as home gardening, to ensure food security during challenging times.
