Three Practical Steps the Church in Botswana Can Take to Respond to Poly-Crisis and Interconnected Challenges

- 1. Establish Crisis Management Teams within the Church:** The Church can form dedicated crisis management teams that focus on addressing multiple crises simultaneously. These teams should include experts in different fields such as economics, health, and environmental science, alongside spiritual leaders, to ensure that the Church's response is multifaceted and informed by a range of perspectives. These teams would assess ongoing challenges and develop coordinated strategies to address them in an integrated manner.
- 2. Partner with Government and NGOs to Address Systemic Issues:** The Church can enhance its role by partnering with government agencies, non-governmental organisations (NGOs), and other community actors to tackle systemic issues that contribute to poly-crisis situations, such as poverty, climate change, and health care access. Through these partnerships, the Church can advocate for long-term solutions that address the root causes of crises rather than just their symptoms, contributing to a more resilient society.
- 3. Develop Educational Programmes on Resilience and Crisis Preparedness:** The Church should create and promote educational programmes aimed at teaching community members about resilience and crisis preparedness. These programmes can cover topics like disaster preparedness, economic resilience, and environmental sustainability, equipping individuals and families with the tools they need to withstand and respond to multiple, overlapping crises.



Three Practical Steps the Church Community Can Take to Respond to the Crisis of Poly-Crisis and Interconnected Challenges

- 1. Create Support Networks for Vulnerable Groups:** Church members can form support networks to assist the most vulnerable populations in their communities, such as the elderly, children, and those living in poverty. This can include activities such as tree planting, waste reduction, and promoting sustainable agricultural practices, which not only address immediate environmental challenges but also help mitigate future crises.
